Step Four

Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves

Following the first three steps: "Admitting our powerlessness; Coming to believe in a Greater Power and then turning to that Power for help;" we get down to the business of really looking at ourselves. Who are we? Who have we been in the recent past? Who do we consider being when confronted right now by a friend, a life partner, a stranger or a colleague? Being willing to truly look at ourselves is what cleans the slate of our lives so we can move forward more freely.

Step Four asks us to do a searching and fearless moral inventory. In other words, look in all the tiny cracks and crevices of our lives to see "who" and "what" is hidden there. This is a crucial undertaking if we want to clear the path to the rest of our program; in other words, if we want to live sober and peaceful lives.

The first three steps have a way of calming our nerves which is good since Step Four can disrupt our calmness as we very honestly look at who we have so frequently been as we journeyed through life. We did do our best at the time, however, so let's not beat ourselves up. We simply want to do better in the future, and we can only do that if we can clearly look at all the defects we so commonly mastered in our days of using alcohol and drugs. And even after coming into this program but prior to doing the Fourth Step, many of us continued to behave in ways that were harmful to those we traveled among.

How lucky we are that we have a clear path to righting the wrongs of our life up to this point. This step asks for a fearless, moral inventory, not a haphazard inventory but one that looks deep into our behavior, not just last month but yesterday too. Every time I think of an inventory I'm reminded of the inventories I helped my uncle do in his grocery store when I was a teenager. I had to count every item on every shelf and make a list so he knew what we needed in future orders and so he could assess what he had earned since the last inventory.

And even though our inventories are different from those, they are still about making a list of what we see still in the shelf of our minds, what we are prone to do or say when in communication with those we travel among. To be fearless means to dig really deep, to look at our resentments and our fears and not be afraid of what we may find. What is there needs to be rooted out so we can have not only a better recovery but be a better companion to all those we are traveling among.

And the inventory needs to address the morality of our lives as well. Exactly where did we step on the toes of others in a cruel way? Where did we behave in a way that was counter to everything we had already learned about the expectation that God had of us? And this is not about beating ourselves up but just being honest with who we were so that we can become who we need to be, not only for us but for all those we are traveling among. We are not accidentally crossing the paths of others. This is a Divine journey and who we show up as will be felt, not only by that individual but by all living forms in the Universe. Our interconnectedness is the impetus to take into full account all that we need to become aware of as we make this inventory.

This inventory step looking at our resentments and our fears is our preparation to then share it with our sponsor or another trusted friend in the program. We need to move forward unfettered by the past once we have admitted to the mistakes of the past. Step Four cleanses us so that we can embrace what is coming next. Step Four is the doorway to freedom from who we were, and it empowers us to move through the doorway to who we feel we can fully be in the future. Step Five here we come.

Each month when we highlight a Step, Tradition, and Concept together, we are reminded how beautifully the spiritual principles of our program support both our personal recovery and our collective service. This month we reflect on Step Four, Tradition Four, and Concept Four—three principles that speak to honest self-examination, responsible autonomy, and the importance of participation in service.

Step Four invites each of us to take a searching and fearless moral inventory. In our personal lives this practice helps us grow spiritually, clearing away what blocks us from usefulness to others. As a fellowship, we see this same spirit reflected in the willingness of groups to conduct inventories and ask how well we are serving the still-suffering alcoholic.

Tradition Four reminds us that each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole. This balance of independence and unity is one of the quiet miracles of Alcoholics Anonymous. Groups throughout our metro area carry the message in their own unique ways while remaining connected through the shared 12th Step work.

Concept Four reinforces this balance by reminding us of the Right of Participation—that those who serve at every level should have a voice in the decisions affecting our service work. Our Board members, committee volunteers, office volunteers, and staff all share in this responsibility. The strength of Intergroup comes from that spirit of shared participation and trusted service.

At the Minneapolis Intergroup office, we see these principles come alive every day. Hotline calls have increased recently, reminding us how vital our shared service work truly is.

It was an exceptionally moving day to witness the program of Alcoholics Anonymous in action right here at your Minneapolis Intergroup office.

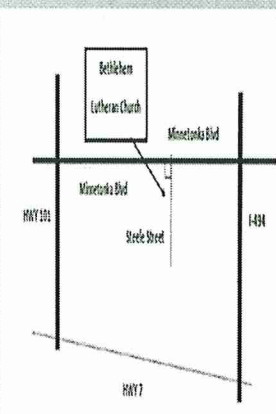

written by Bill W. in 1962***

Concept Four

Short Form – Concept IV

At all responsible levels, we ought to maintain a traditional "Right of Participation," allowing a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.

Long Form – Concept IV

Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.

Concept IV reminds us that Alcoholics Anonymous works best when participation is shared. Our Fellowship was built on the idea that no single person or small group should hold all authority. Instead, responsibility and participation go hand in hand. When we are asked to serve, we are also given a voice in the decisions connected with that service.

When we practice Concept IV, we recognize that wisdom is often found in many voices rather than one. Our Districts, Area, Conference, and Committees function best when the people doing the work are also allowed to share their judgment. As you help me prepare for Conference at month's end I am reminded that I was elected to represent and serve the Groups of Area 36 for 51 weeks a year, and on the 52nd week we as a Conference of approximately 125 members including Delegates, Trustees, Board Members, certain Staff of GSO come together to vote on what is in A.A.'s best interest.

This concept also reminds us that service is not about hierarchy. WE serve together whether as a trustee, a delegate, a committee member, or a trusted servant at the group level, each role carries both responsibility and the right to contribute.

For us as members of A.A., Concept IV encourages willingness. It invites us to step forward, participate, and share our experience and perspective when called upon. At the same time, it asks us to listen carefully to others who carry responsibility in different areas of service. It is also a healthy reminder to me about the spirit of rotation and our willingness and responsibility to let the next person have their experiences as well, serving others.

Ultimately, Concept IV reflects a deeper spiritual truth: A.A. functions through shared trust, we trust our trusted servants. By giving each responsible servant a meaningful voice, we strengthen unity and ensure that our decisions reflect the collective wisdom of the Fellowship rather than the authority of any single individual.

***The Twelve Traditions -
How They Apply In Our Lives***

Tradition Four

Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole

A.A.'s Fourth Tradition states: "Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole." In one sentence, it protects the freedom that allows local groups to meet where they are—culturally, geographically, and spiritually—while also setting a boundary that keeps the fellowship from splintering into competing versions of A.A. Tradition Four recognizes a basic reality: recovery happens in real communities, and no one single format works equally for everyone. Autonomy lets groups adapt their meeting style, schedule and local customs so that we (alcoholics) can find a place where we feel safe enough to tell the truth and keep coming back.

This autonomy is practical as well as philosophical. Groups can and do experiment, some emphasize discussion, others speaker meetings, some follow a reading format, some offer First Step groups for newcomers, a type of meeting within a meeting. Some meetings will meet in a church basement, others at the local community center, some may meet at a restaurant/coffee shop, some groups may be multi-lingual when necessary. Because groups fund themselves and manage their own affairs, they can respond quickly to local needs without waiting for a centralized authority. In this way, Tradition Four supports A.A.'s primary purpose by helping meetings remain accessible, relevant, and welcoming to the alcoholic who still suffers.

At the same time, the "except" clause is essential. A group's choices can ripple outward in ways that may harm other groups or the public understanding of A.A. For example, if a group publicly affiliates with an outside organization, endorses a treatment center, or takes positions on controversial issues, it may confuse the public and compromise A.A.'s neutrality. If a group uses the A.A. name to promote non A.A. materials, charges dues beyond voluntary contributions, or presents itself as the only "true" form of A.A., it can create division and damage trust. Tradition Four asks groups to weigh their independence against the shared responsibility to protect A.A.'s reputation and unity—the very conditions that allow meetings to exist for future newcomers.

Ultimately, Tradition Four is less about independence for its own sake and more about responsible freedom. It invites each group to practice the same balance we as members seek in our own sobriety, making choices that fit one's circumstances while remaining accountable to something larger than oneself. When groups honor autonomy with care, they preserve the creative diversity that keeps A.A. alive and local, and they also preserve the unity that keeps A.A. recognizable and trustworthy. In that balance, Tradition Four helps ensure that wherever an alcoholic reaches out—today or in the future - there will be a meeting ready to offer hope.
