Step Eleven



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

The Twelve Traditions -How They Apply In Our Lives

Tradition Eleven

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.

"You can't con a con." That's a phrase I heard early on in A.A. and it stuck with me, because it described me. I was a master manipulator and could sniff out other manipulators and promoters easily. When I finally admitted that truth about myself, then the Eleventh Tradition became a helpful tool for humility and unity rather than a rule to oppress my 'entrepreneurial spirit.' Personal anonymity and humility became my keys to belonging.

There are a couple of ways to consider personal anonymity as it relates to promotion. One is at the public level of press, radio, film, television and, for many today, the internet. The other is at the non-public level of meetings and communications that do not involve public media.

At the public level I learned that we didn't need to hire a PR firm or use any form of public media to promote ourselves. In A.A. we let our work and our non-alcoholic friends convey the positive results. This organic means of communication keeps the fellowship from becoming commercialized or dependent on specific personalities. Moreover, the press became our ally by respecting the Eleventh Tradition. For the most part, they have helped us stay on track by keeping members' full names and pictures out of copy. In my personal experience, attraction by example, rather than promotion has provided a lifeline to those I might have driven away by aggressively promoting A.A.


There is also no spokesperson for A.A. That was an important concept for me to grasp, realizing there would be no titles to vie for. What a huge blessing! One key reason noted in *Twelve Steps And Twelve Traditions*, (p. 181) is that each of us had been an "irrepressible promoter." My own specialty was self-promotion rooted in fear and ego. I may not have asked for your approval, but I didn't believe I could progress without it. After working the Steps and the Traditions with my sponsor it was clear that seeking approval kept me apart from you. Bottom line: I didn't have to promote anything, least of all myself.

On the other hand, this does not mean we evade others in 'the spirit of anonymity.' Quite the opposite. In fact, Dr. Bob mentioned two ways to break the Tradition of anonymity: "1) By giving your name at the level of press or radio; 2) by being so anonymous that you can't be reached by other drunks." (Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers, p.264). That's why many of us today give our full names at meetings and provide our contact information on group lists or to interested individuals. Those lists kept me connected even when I couldn't stay sober or get to meetings, and I rely on them today to help carry the message.

It's important to practice both aspects of Tradition Eleven. We must maintain anonymity at the public level but be available at the non-public level to serve other alcoholics. Because someone has always been available to me, I want to do the same for others. The joy that comes from being of service provides all the acknowledgment and approval I need, as well as a deeper relationship with my higher power.

I'm grateful that Tradition Eleven shows us how to practice anonymity at the appropriate levels, helping to safeguard our fellowship while attracting those who need us.

REFLECTIONS ON CONNECTIONS

One of my favorite commitments in AA was being an AA Orientation Meeting coordinator. The meeting was located in St Louis Park, and I was living in Saint Paul at the time. Thankfully I accepted the invitation and didn't let the distance deter me. I was about 5 years sober; the Intergroup manager at the time was probably trying to talk me into standing for the Intergroup Board and I didn't feel ready for that. Aside from the absolute joy of being part of that meeting and the consistent message of hope from the speakers, I loved starting out my weekend with the amazing group of AA members who frequent the meeting.

Two pivotal events happened while I was doing that commitment. I met a woman who would become a lifelong friend at her 2nd meeting. She ended up finding meetings and a contact person after calling Intergroup's 24-hour hotline. I will never forget the moment we connected in that meeting; it is a friendship that has weathered all the ups and downs of life. I am forever grateful I was willing to be of service so God could send me a lifelong friendship.

The second event had a huge impact, and I fully believe that I met up with God at the meeting. On my way from the meeting to fellowship one Saturday morning, my dad called me in tears to let me know my sister, who lived in Florida, was in a severe car accident. She was not yet alert and did not know the extent or severity of her injuries, but they knew she had a Spinal Cord Injury. I pulled over on the highway. When I started driving again, my car continued to fellowship. I stepped out of the car and collapsed in tears into a fellow AA's arms. Having no idea what I was supposed to do next, they took my phone and called my sponsor, arranged for my sponsor to meet at my house. Somehow they got me and my car back home to Saint Paul and I was on my way to Florida that night. Left to my own devices, I am sure I would have asked myself questions like, can I afford to fly to Florida today, what about taking time off of work, should I wait or go now?? Instead, my fellow AA's and sponsor helped me do the next right thing. When I arrived at the hospital, my mom walked out of the emergency room doors and collapsed from the news that my sister would not walk again. God gave me strength to help my family and support my sister.

My experience is to show up and be of service and the promises start to come true in my life. Without AA and trust in God, I don't actually know what the next right thing to do is. Even with AA and trust, I still need my fellow AA's and sponsorship for guidance.

I have reconnected to the AA orientation meeting this year, it is every bit as wonderful as it has always been and some of those same women are there to welcome me and are ever ready to pick me back up when I need it again.
