### Step Three

### "Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him."

The phone rang and the young lady from Minneapolis Intergroup asked if I would be willing to write an article for the March MIRUS on Step Three. "Panic," I'm not qualified! And my sponsor's words got on the squirrel cage in the back of my skull. "If at all possible, you don't say no in AA when asked to do something." Rats, gotta say yes.

After spending almost three decades trying to drink away the bad memories of Vietnam, and progressively getting worse, I had finally beaten myself into a state of reasonableness. My life was unmanageable (Step 1) and I knew it. This thing called Alcoholics Anonymous sounded weird. I spent the first three months helping to clean up after meetings and never did find any brandy (you were all just too happy) in the coffee cups. I finally came to believe you were telling the truth, AA does work (Step 2).

Now this Step 3 thing, and the "God" word.....Your not making this easy are you?

You took the time to break it down into small pieces that this skeptical slow learner could understand.

Made a decision.

In retrospect, we already made a decision to get help when we staggered through the doors to that first meeting. But decisions require action or they are nothing. So, finish what you started for once, just to be different, OK?

I was told that knowledge of the physical and mental damage I did to myself while drinking was important to my recovery. However, lasting contented sobriety can only be gained by fully surrendering to Step 3. The physical, mental, and spiritual solution works best when all three aspects are treated.


Turn my will over? No thank you, I'm doing just fine. Oh really? And what brought you here, a winning streak? No, my will was self will, run riot. My will is to be drunk, to dodge reality, and shirk responsibility. Ok, lets try the easier softer way.

Turn over my life? Now lets talk about this. Oh, half measures...ok BUT! Yeah, that winners streak I was on....I really don't like it when you blow holes in my alcoholic logic. And what do I really have for an alternative? Back to the streets and oblivion? No Thanks. You seem to have something that maybe I'd like to have too.

Then the lights started to come on one by one. There it was, the key for me, stuck in the middle of Step Three, hidden between "the" and "of" was a word I had missed for several months - CARE. Nobody cared for me, heck I didn't even like me...and the ice started to melt. The walls I had built for protection that had become my own prison started to show cracks. Maybe, just maybe, there actually is a "God of my understanding" who cares for a low bottom drunk like me. When that thought slowly sank in, not in my head, but in my soul, the light got a little brighter and a sliver of peace crept in, and I could visualize some serenity off in the future.

There are a lot of words written about Step 3. There is a pray-

I recently attended a three day conference. During a presentation a question was put forth to those attending: "How many do not know about the Faithful Fiver Program?" I was shocked by how many raised their hand. It really seemed like half of those attending were unaware of the Faithful Fiver Program. I would like to take the opportunity to get this information to anyone who is not aware.

Most Central Offices across the US and Canada use this program to help financially support their service center. The Faithful Fiver idea came about when a group of members remembered that they wasted much more than five

dollars a month during their drinking days. (See the program form in this MIRUS for more information or to set up your monthly contribution.)

Did you know we have an EFT (electronic funds transfer) program? If you fill out the form one time, you don't have to think about it any more. Your contribution will automatically be deducted from whatever account you choose: credit card, checking account, savings, etc., each month. When we set up your contribution on a secure site, we cut out and shred your account information so your number is no longer accessible on any paperwork in the Intergroup Office. You can cancel anytime you like. You will get a receipt after each contribution is made by email or by US mail. If you choose, go directly to the Intergroup website and click on "Contribute" to skip the paper enrollment. Call Minneapolis Intergroup anytime if you have a question. There is also the Birthday Plan you can participate in. Call the staff at the Intergroup Office anytime or your sponsor.

### **Notes from Your Board Chair:**

It consistently sets my thinking in a better direction than it had been prior to the prayer. Additionally, I often get a feeling of gratitude for messages like the ones found in this prayer that are available to me because of this Fellowship. How fortunate we are to have had the design for living laid out in the 12 Steps passed on, to give us lives where we can experience true freedom from alcohol and our own self will.

In that spirit of gratitude, I wish to extend my most enthusiastic invitation to Intergroup's annual Gratitude Night at the Minneapolis Convention Center April 13, 2019. As many of us may recall, last year's Gratitude Night event went on despite the worst blizzard we had seen in the area for decades! This year, I understand our office manager has put a brave volunteer in charge of the weather, so it should work out exactly like we plan this time around (wink wink). ### Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

### Concept III:

Long Form: As a traditional means of creating and maintaining a clearly defined working relation between the groups, the Conference, the A.A. General Service Board and its several service corporations, staffs, committees and executives, and of thus insuring their effective leadership, it is here suggested that we endow each of these elements of world service with a traditional "Right of Decision."

Short Form: "To ensure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. - the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees and executives - with a traditional "Right of Decision."

In Concept II of the Service Manual, Bill talks about the ultimate authority and responsibility being given to the General Service Board by the fellowship. He also says that there cannot be effective leadership of the General Service Board without our trust. If we trust God and the process then we should be able to trust those we have given the ultimate authority to.

What does the "Right of Decision" mean? When I was the GSR of my home group (Third Tradition Group in Northfield), I was tasked with bringing information about my group to the District 16 meetings and Area Assemblies. It was also my job to bring information in regards to the District and Area 36 business back to my group. Then we could make an informed decision for me to report back to my District or Area events. It was at these events that some new information did come up in discussion. When that happened and I felt that my group would change their vote based on that new information, I then used my right of decision to change our vote. That also meant that when I went back to my group I had to fully explain to them why I changed their vote, and what the new information was.

Bill also talks about our Delegates that we send to the Conference in New York. He tells us that they are messengers of our conscience, but we should not dictate to them how to vote. We should send them with our conscience with the "Right of Decision" as well. That truly the Conference can solve World Service matters that we surely could not on our own as a fellowship. Now, I personally have heard many "opinions" on both sides of that discussion in the 21 years of being sober and being around General Service. And both opinions are valid in their own right. Truly I believe that we have to trust that we in Area 36 have always been fully informed by our Delegates and I trust the Third Legacy Voting process that we use to elect our Delegates.

I know we have always been well represented at the General Service Conference. I hope to keep that tradition alive.

On page 13 of the Service Manual in Concept III, Bill states, "There will always be plenty of ultimate authority to correct inefficiency, ineffectiveness, or abuse. If the Conference does not function well, the groups can send in better Delegates. If the Trustees get badly out of line, the Conference can censure them, or even reorganize them. If the Headquarters' services go sour, the Trustees can elect better directors and hire better help. These remedies are ample and direct. But for so long as our world services function reasonably well and there should always be charity for occasional mistakes then 'trust' must be our watchword, otherwise we shall wind up leaderless."

### The Twelve Traditions - How They Apply In Our Lives

### TRADITION THREE

"The only requirement for A.A. membership is the desire to stop drinking."

When I walked into my first Meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous more than 30 years, ago. I had an attitude. I was waiting to be told what I had to do to tow the A.A. line. I suspected A.A. would try to force some kind of religious dogma down my unwilling throat. Or worse, I'd be brainwashed into this cult called A.A. Skeptical and scared, I was on high alert for anything I could interpret as coercion.

Fortunately, I'd wandered into a Step and Tradition group that took Tradition Three to heart: They said the only requirement for A.A. membership was a desire to stop drinking. Did I have that? If not, I could go back out and try some controlled drinking. Having already tried to control my drinking—try living with someone in A.A. while you're pretending to be a social drinker—I didn't need more "experimenting." I needed help. And even in my confused state, I realized this was the place I could get it.

Today, I thank God for the Tradition that says I'm a member if I say I am. That makes it possible for me to listen to every member of Alcoholics Anonymous, newcomer or old-timer. We might not have anything else in common—many of us never would have been drinking buddies—but we're the same: We're alcoholics.

To me, this is the real decision I had to make; do I want to get better? Do I want what you have? Yes, and the decision is "to go on and do the rest of the Steps to the best of my ability." Not perfectly, it can't be done. Just honestly the best I can do today.




