April 2019 Step, Tradition, and Concept Four

Step Four

"Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves."

This step comes after we have done the other three steps, admitting our powerlessness over alcohol, coming to believe that a Higher Power can restore us to sanity and making a decision to turn our will and lives over the care of a Higher Power, of our understanding. In the Fourth Step, fearless and searching describes that one must address the truth about themselves, not just minor infractions, but the secrets that make one break out into a cold sweat when thinking about putting them on paper. But these are the very things which will set us free in recovery and give us the courage and strength to complete the remaining steps.

I've heard it said that one only needs to do one Fourth Step in recovery. In my experience, as we continue to live life on life's terms, change and grow, as do our surroundings, circumstances and life stages, another moral inventory often becomes necessary. Some not in a 12 Step program may say, "you mean you keep reading the same book and talking about the same steps over and over?" My response is that I am different, each meeting is different and so when you add those components, they are not the same passages, and the steps take on new meanings depending on where each of us is at on a daily basis.

My Fourth Steps were completed in the format of the Big Book and the columns 1) addressing person, place or thing, 2) what happened, 3) what it affected and, 4) my part. This step is completed so we can look at ourselves and see the role we have played and how we have shown up in the world. I like the phrase, "becoming right sized." We are often folks of extremes, thinking we are either high above others or far below them, with the truth somewhere in between. Completing the Fourth Step gives us insights and allows us to see the patterns of our behavior. Doing this step with a sponsor is imperative, in my experience. This will help you stay on track, getting guidance as you go into areas of your life that may have been contributing factors to your drinking, and facing that we were not only hurting ourselves with our drinking and behavior.

When faced with fear in completing the Fourth Step, we have to remember that what led to our coming into this program of recovery was a nightmare of mental, physical and spiritual sickness that left us defeated and broken as we walked in the doors. In considering those recollections, how could completing the Fourth Step be any worse of an experience? If you


are in a fight with a porcupine (the disease of alcoholism) wouldn't you want all of the quills pulled out, or would you want to leave some of them in because they were in a sensitive or embarrassing area. Personally, that would motivate me more to have them removed.

The freedom that comes from taking this inventory and the information that it gives us about ourselves is invaluable and well worth the discomfort. In learning that we are active players in our lives, we can see that we are no longer victims and our relationships with others and ourselves have an opportunity for restoration. In trying to find your way to a new destination, you need to know where you are starting from in order to figure out how to get there.

The General Service Theme for 2019 is:

“Our Big Book - 80 Years, 71 Languages.”

Minneapolis Intergroup takes a great interest in what happens at the annual General Service Conference each year in New York. Each item on the agenda is taken very seriously and goes through a painstaking process requiring approval by a select committee, as well as the Conference body as a whole. Finally each item must be approved by the General Service Board in its required annual meeting following the Conference.

An item may involve a change in the title of a pamphlet. You may ask why bother? A change of words can make a powerful statement and affect the reader's perception of the material. An item up for approval may involve revising content to reflect current experiences.

We want to know what literature changes will be forthcoming to be sure Minneapolis Intergroup has the most up to date literature for all AA members in our area. And when new literature is published, we want to have it available for you. We have some of the updated literature in stock now. More will be coming soon.

At the 2018 Annual Conference, eleven pamphlets and two books have been revised. A new publication coming is titled: *Our Great Responsibility: A Selection of Bill W.'s General Service Talks, 1951-1970*. During the course of twenty General Service Conferences Bill gave more than thirty-three talks, sixteen of which have been gathered for this new book. It should be available the end of May 2019.

2019 Conference agenda items are being talked about at the group level now. Every GSR (General Service Representative) will bring their groups consensus to the Delegate's Workshop in Northfield on April 6th. The purpose of this workshop is to inform our Delegate, Missy P. on how the AA members in southern Minnesota feel about the topics up for discussion. She will be our voice at the 69th General Service Conference in May.

One way I do this is with a group of other women in the Program by listing five gratefuls within the group each morning. This may seem basic, but it sure does make me pause, reflect, and set my thinking on a plane more aligned with something bigger than myself.

We hope to see as many of your bright faces at this ticketed event as possible, so that we may collectively express our thankfulness and appreciation for all that you do for Minneapolis Intergroup daily. As many may recall, last year's event nearly got snowed out, though as so often happens with Alcoholics Anonymous, the meeting went on despite the inability of many to participate. 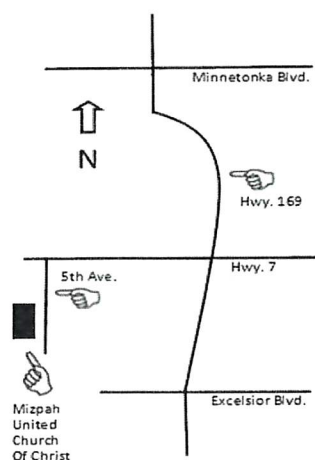

Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

Concept IV:

Long Form: "Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional 'Right of Participation', taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge."

Short Form: "At all responsible levels, we ought to maintain a traditional 'Right of Participation,' allowing a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge."

Last issue in Concept III, I talked to you about the Right of Decision. I mentioned in the last full paragraph that I would be going to the General Service Conference on the behalf of Southern Minnesota Area 36. That is where the Right of Participation comes into play for the Delegate. Bill and Bob turned the fellowship over to us, the members of Alcoholics Anonymous. They did it so that we could take care of it. They gave us the authority but also the responsibility to ensure its future.

What does that mean? Well, it means that with ultimate authority comes responsibility and therefore the Right of Participation. I talked about the Right of Decision as well. All of this comes together at the Conference. As your Delegate, I bring to you all of the topics that will be discussed at the Conference in May. I give it to your groups so that you may have a voice in those topics at the conference. The ultimate authority is yours, therefore you should be informed to be able to make those decisions. As you send me off to New York I will take the Area's conscience with me. As I hear discussion at the conference I may hear something new that may change our Area's conscience in regards to that topic. I then have the Right of Decision to change our "vote." I also have the responsibility to come back to you and explain why I changed our vote. The "Right of Participation" is where: you asked me to serve you as Delegate; I have the "Right of Participation" at the Conference to change the vote. You are not sending me blindly with a decision and that is it. As it can best be explained it is that I am not a robot being sent with information to give. You are allowing me to fully participate in the process, just as we as an Area are given the "Right of Participation" at the Conference. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you at the Conference! It is a great honor!!

The Twelve Traditions - How They Apply In Our Lives

TRADITION FOUR

"Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole."

Tradition Four states: Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole. The word "autonomous" means self-governing, not subject to the control of another. So, because of this tradition each meeting is free to choose how to conduct their meeting as long as it doesn't adversely affect other meetings or AA as a whole.

I will forever be grateful for this tradition because there was so much variety in meetings when I first got sober. Soon after going to my first few meetings and having no success in finding a willing sponsor, it was suggested to me that I call Minneapolis Intergroup, that they would set me up with a sponsor. I later learned that Intergroup doesn't do that, but nevertheless I called and was told that someone would call me back in a few minutes. A guy named Bill called me soon after and invited to a meeting that night. That turned into a meeting almost every night for a long time.

Because of this tradition I was introduced to a wide variety of meetings: speaker meetings, step meetings, discussion meetings, Big Book meetings and others. Had all of the meetings followed the same rigid formula, I am sure I would have been bored out of my mind and therefore would have found an excuse not to go.

Even today, after many years of attending meetings, I find it refreshing to find a meeting format that offers an innovative approach. Recently I've been attending a new meeting that listens to Joe and Charlie tapes and then we go around the room and share our thoughts about what we have just heard. So I am truly grateful for this tradition and to AA for giving me a new life.

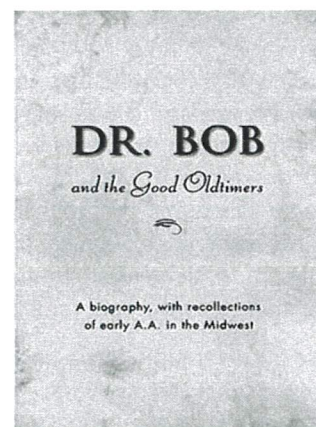
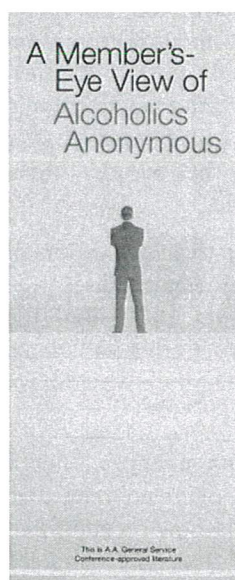

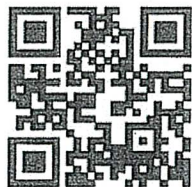
