Step Ten

"Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

The longer I've been sober, the more I incorporate the steps of the program into my everyday life. It has been said in the rooms of AA that the steps that start with a number one should be done every day. When I first heard this, I stopped to think of the steps that started with one. It then became clear why this was such a good idea.

Of course, we need to do Step 1 each day. "Admitted we were powerless over alcohol – that our lives had become unmanageable. If I don't remember Step 1, I risk going back to using and using means death of a productive and useful life.

The next step in the equation is Step 10. Step 10 is the beginning of the maintenance Steps; 10, 11, and 12. When I go through my day, and I'm disturbed, I often to go Step 10 and try to figure out my part in the discomfort. Am I disturbed because I have unrealistic expectations of life? Am I refusing to accept life on life's terms? Sometimes, I expect everything in life to be easy and pleasant, and then I'm reminded that we exist to grow and learn. Growing and learning means we face our challenges. Step 10 helps me to evaluate my actions, beliefs, and behavior. I want to become a better person, which is a never-ending quest.

To follow the concept of doing all the steps each day that starts with a number one, we are brought to Step 11 and Step 12. Step 11 – Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God. Step 11 helps me to stay connected with my Higher Power, the life-blood of the program. Step 12 – Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these Steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principals in all our affairs. Step 12 helps me to remember to carry the message and live the principals of the program each day.

I'm so thankful for the AA Program. Step 10 is the beginning of the maintenance Steps. I'm reminded that I can work this program one day at a time and through the good times and the bad times it offers many blessings to grow in our personal development.

Notes from your Service Office:

The General Service Theme for 2019 is:

"Our Big Book - 80 Years, 71 Languages."

The Intergroup Information Committee, also referred to as AA Information Talks, is an important 12 Step service of Greater Minneapolis Intergroup.

In addition to telling your personal story we are requesting that each AA member provide information on what AA is and what AA is not. Your commitment would be to speak one time each month.

We currently have thirty non-AA facilities we schedule speakers for. They consist of out-patient treatment centers, residential and a few inpatient treatment centers. We serve seventeen locations in Minneapolis and Suburban cities. Some cities include Farmington, Chanhassen, Waconia, Minneapolis, Brooklyn Center, Coon Rapids, Fridley, Otsego, etc. You will shadow someone for your first two commitments for your orientation. Our two coordinators schedule fifty-five (55) commitments per month. If you would be interested in serving on this committee call me at the Intergroup office at 952-922-0880 to arrange a time to meet.

The suggested requirements are three years of sobriety and consistent service experience. Information Committee members are Board selected. Board selection takes place at the monthly Board Meetings.

Better yet, on Saturday, November 2nd immediately fol-

lowing the regular Saturday Orientation Meeting, at 11:00 am will be the AA Information Talk Orientation (see the flyer inserted in this issue). We invite everyone currently on the Committee to come and share their experience and/or voice any issues speaking at these facilities. We will also have a long time member of the committee demonstrate how they do a presentation. Lunch will be provided.



Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

Concept X:

Long Form: Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority- the scope of such authority to be always well defined whether by tradition, by resolution, by specific job description or by appropriate charters and bylaws.

Short Form: Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority, with the scope of such authority well defined.

Concept 10 points out that our trusted servants need to have a clearly defined authority to carry the daily responsibilities given. When I am given the responsibility to serve, I must also be granted the same amount of authority to fulfill my obligation to those I serve. The guiding principal of this concept for me is to respect those whom I serve and those that serve the fellowship as a whole. If we are choosing our trusted servants based on the spiritual principles, then God is our ultimate authority. This means that authority must be delegated at all levels of AA for it to run effectively and not collapse. The responsibilities should be well defined for the authority given to for each task. Each level has its own format for the defined responsibilities and authorities such as:

The groups have their own for their General Service Representatives, The Districts have their own guidelines or bylaws, the Area has bylaws that are filed with the state that mandate their responsibilities/authority. The Area Committee holds them accountable which is made of the Area 36 Groups. The bylaws for our Trustees responsibilities and the authority given to them are found in the A.A. Service Manual. That is why it is so important that we make sure that we do not change that Service Manual. The Trustees are held accountable by the groups through the Delegates. But at the same time they cannot be given directives to give to the trustees. There has to be a certain level of trusting your trusted servants for it all to work effectively. If we were to try to give directives, imagine how much longer each task would take trying to poll all A.A Groups. We truly would get nothing accomplished. We recently had an agenda item in Literature where the AAWS Policy on Publishing was possibly going to be changed. The original policy gives the AAWS Publishing dept the authority to make small editing changes such as: adding commas or punctuations and changing run on sentences to make more sense of the content. They wanted the authority to make updates of our literature without conference approval. To me that goes beyond the authority that we originally gave them and we could end up with a lot of literature that is non conferenced approved. So, that brings us to our responsibilities as AA members to make sure we update our own literature and approve it through our delegates at the Conference in New York each year!!

TRADITION Ten

AA Has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy

When I first got sober it occurred to me that the world and its many organizations, i.e. religions, political parties, and national businesses, such as news organizations need to hear the AA messages so that they would adhere to our traditions, etc.

Thankfully I had a sponsor that set me straight on just exactly what I might be able to do. That was to take care of me and my sobriety and leave the world to take care of themselves.

At that time, I was living in Northeast Minneapolis, just north of Lowry Ave. A woman came to my door with a petition she wanted me to sign. It seemed that the area north of Lowry and Central avenue were zoned "no liquor outlets." The city was planning on allowing liquor into that zone, and this woman wanted me to sign the petition to not allow that. I at first got really excited about the fact that an AA member might have some impact on this. After a few minutes the thought of my sponsor's words came to me and I did not mention that I was an AA member, but I just said that I had no opinion on this matter.

When it comes to matters of personal application to this tradition, my wife and I adhere to the principle: that if we don't discuss these things privately we will never discuss them in public:




