## Step Two

"Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity."

I have always believed in a power greater than myself. I was raised Catholic, so I pray and worship as a Catholic. However, I do not define my Higher Power (God) as Catholic. To me, God is in everyone and everything and is not confined to any one religious belief or spiritual practice. To me, God is a very loving, immensely powerful form of energy, that I cannot define or explain. My belief is that God's will for me is to act according to the Golden Rule, "do unto others as I would have done unto me" and follow that rule as my guiding principle in everything I do.

Alcohol made me feel safe and secure, no one could hurt me because I was numb to all feeling. I was invincible. I smelled like the mop closet in an old dive bar, but I was invincible. I could talk to you, I would be smart, I would know the answer, and the right answer. I was funny. Everyone would be laughing, and I did not even have to try. It all just came to me! Then I would fall asleep, forget all about it and do it all over again. I never abandoned faith in God while I was drinking, I just lived by my own will. In my mind I was completely sane, except for occasionally talking out loud to myself. It did not occur to me that maybe living amid revolving doors of jails, institutions, hospitals, and being useless to my fellows was not a picture of sanity.

Sobriety is scary. I have spent so many years in a state of "pleasant" inebriation that I feel like a blank slate. In sobriety I do not know anything. Everything is a new experience. I had been actively drinking to the point of drunkenness everyday of my life since I was 18 years old. At many points I was very functional, but at most of those points functionality was only what I looked like on paper. Reality was a mess. There have been some periods of sobriety here and there. Today as I write this, I am at my longest honest stretch of sobriety in 20+ years. I have 6 months. With that said, my Higher Power has become such an integral part of my daily practice. In the 12x12 reading on the 11th Step it says that prayer is like sunshine and breathing air, which is so true to me right now. Prayer is one of my greatest lifelines. It rejuvenates me and clears my thoughts in a way that alcohol never could. If I do not get a prayer walk in daily, I am not myself and I do not feel that necessary spiritual connectedness to the loving power of

God. Prayer walks are when I walk and pray. It is meditative for me, because my mind does not sit still when I sit still yet. When my thoughts are spiritually centered, I do not have a desire to drink, and for that I am immeasurably grateful. God and prayer are only one part of my take on, "came to believe in a power greater than ourselves." In the program of AA I am not alone. AA is a "we" program. I have all these people who understand alcoholism around me. I am not the only one who ever carried a fruit juice bottle filled with wine in their purse or feigned major illness and catastrophe to get out of important events due to drinking. There are rooms and rooms filled with similar stories and people who understand me. When I seemingly forget all concept of the English language mid-sentence while sharing in a meeting, no one seems to judge me; only look at me with that been there, done that smile. I am not alone. I feel that safety and security that I got from alcohol in a way that I never thought possible. When I have a bad day, I call one of my AA friends and they listen and understand and make me laugh. I receive calls from my AA friends, and it makes my day to hear from them. I feel that surge of confidence I used to get from alcohol in a way that is not only socially acceptable, but it also adds value to my life and others. I get to talk with my sponsor every day and I get to share my 10th Step inventory and work through the 12 Steps with her. When I am straying towards self-will I am set back on the right path, and it is a blessing. I feel so grateful. I am grateful to be able to think of my Higher Power in two ways; one as God, the intangible feeling of safety and protection, and the other as AA my network of friends and family who understand my insanity and are there for me and I get to be there for them sober.

As for restoring sanity. My thinking has changed. I no longer talk out loud to myself. Kidding, I still do that. Seriously, I am more aware of when I am not acting in accordance with the golden rule, when I am in a state of self will run riot. Prayer, slowing down when I feel irritable, and not immediately reacting are huge assets in my returning to sanity. Using checks and balances, talking to my sponsor or my AA friends before any major actions are huge assets in my returning to sanity. I will never be completely sane. It is said in AA, progress not perfection and one day at a time!

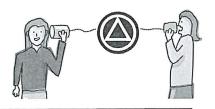

# Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

Concept II: When, in 1955, the A.A. groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Service Conference, they thereby delegated to the Conference complete authority for the active maintenance of our world services and thereby made the Conference – excepting for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of the Conference Charter – the actual voice and the effective conscience for our whole Society.

Alcoholics Anonymous does not have a hierarchy that enforces rules or metes out judgment on erring members or groups. There are no "bosses" in A.A. in the traditional sense of the word. Instead, there is a structure of partially delegated and partially retained authority that governs the business of our spiritual society. Where does the "authority" lie that is referred to in the Concept and what does it include? What "power" is not included?

Delegates are the active voice of the conscience of our Fellowship. As a newly elected delegate, I am given the authority to speak and act on behalf of A.A. groups and members in matters coming before the Conference. Each year the Conference discusses ideas and suggestions that are advanced for our consideration. These ideas might come from a member or group or they might be forwarded by the previous year's Conference. Ideas might include developing a new edition of the Big Book or developing a new pamphlet to try to make A.A. accessible to as many people as possible or suggestions on how to better reach and inform professionals about A.A. In recent years we have talked about whether or not to use current technologies like LinkedIn and we have updated our literature to include information about new practices like using a "virtual basket" for the 7th Tradition. The work is essential to the ongoing functioning and effectiveness of our Fellowship. It would be difficult if not impossible to accomplish without some kind of structure. Thanks to the principle in Concept II, we have a system of delegated authority that has worked for the Fellowship for a long time.

It is important to note that delegates make decisions on behalf of the whole of A.A. They are not representatives of the geographic areas who elect them in the manner you might think. We definitely bring the experience and viewpoints of our local area with us to the conference table, but our charge is to vote in the best interests of A.A. as a whole. Our delegated power is for the benefit of all of Alcoholics Anonymous.

The rest of the power lies with the Fellowship. Members and groups don't delegate all of their power. They retain a virtually supreme power to alter the world service structure and to criticize its operation. This power flows through the General Service Representative. The G.S.R. provides a vital link to ensuring that your group gets to exercise its power over A.A. affairs or express criticism of how they are being handled. Members who are informed have the power to shape the course of our Fellowship's future. This type of power is pretty unique and too often goes underutilized by our members. Here is how you can exercise it this year: In mid-February, the agenda items for the 2021 General Service Conference will become available for your review and for discussion by your group. The Conference takes place in mid-April. That gives everyone two months to read, digest, discuss and ask questions. Attend your local district meeting and the Delegate's Workshop to gain additional perspective and express your views (or at least make sure your group's G.S.R. does). Area 36 may provide new opportunities in addition to the Delegate's Workshop for members to become more informed. Keep an eye on the area website Area36.org for announcements of upcoming events. Keep in mind that the more voices a delegate hears the broader our perspective will be and the more spiritual the overall process will be.

### **Reader Experience**

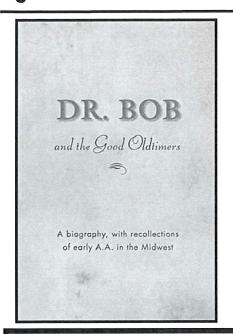

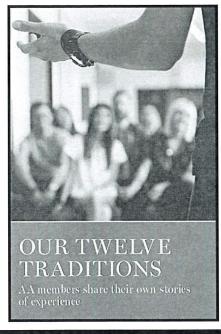

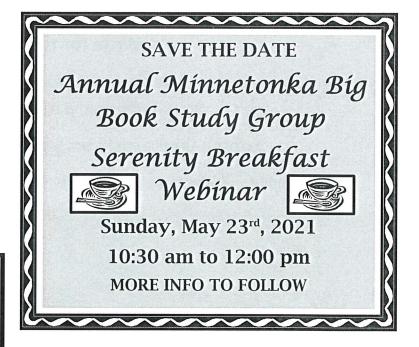
