## Step Five

*"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."*

When I came into the rooms of AA I came in with a lot of baggage, as we all do. One of the heaviest pieces I was dragging around was "fear" and it was pretty all-encompassing. There was fear of failure with my job, fear of loss of financial security, fear of no longer having anyone love me, fear of trying new things, and fear of the unknown future. I'd become disgusted with the person I'd become and had actually started to think death might be the only way out of the mess of my life. Desperation saved me and I'm grateful for the 'gift' of my desperation. It created a small crack in the wall that alcohol had surrounded me with, allowing honesty to creep in, and enabling me to admit I was an alcoholic.

Desperation to honesty to the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous. The first two steps were not hard. Yes, I was powerless over alcohol and my life was unmanageable, and yes, I certainly was not able to restore my sanity on my own. Step Three didn't slow me down much. At the beginning of my journey in AA I did not have any kind of relationship with God. I used the success of the program of AA, and the fellowship, to be my higher power, knowing that if I did what was suggested to me, I could have what they had. Step Four was a little more scary. I had avoided looking at my motives and behavior for years, but knew if I was to have that serenity they all seemed to have then I needed to recognize these defects of character and call them by name. But Step Five? Tell another human being all the selfish, nasty things I'd done, things that I never wanted anyone to know because they proved what an awful person I was? Again I was given the gift of desperation. If I wanted to keep this new found sobriety past when the Pink Cloud was no longer enough I would have to talk to my sponsor about the exact nature of my wrongs, and let go of that baggage load. And I did exactly that.

One sunny late spring afternoon my sponsor and I met at the Eloise Butler Wildlife Garden and I told another living soul my secrets. My sponsor listened, nodded, told me some of her similar experiences. And the sun continued to shine, the earth continued in its orbit, the flowers did not wither up and die.

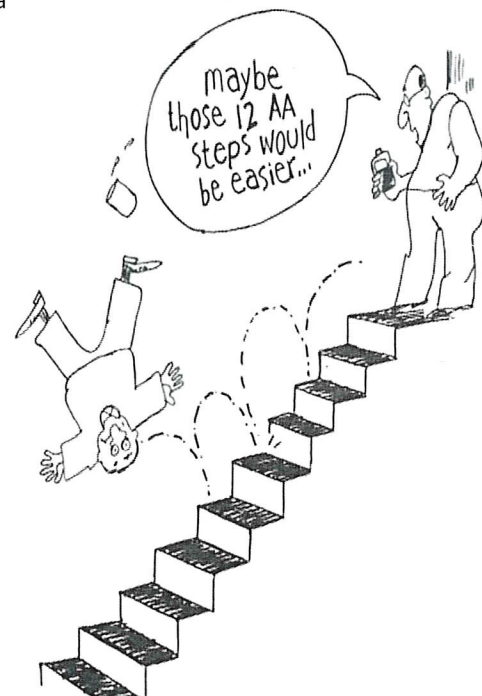
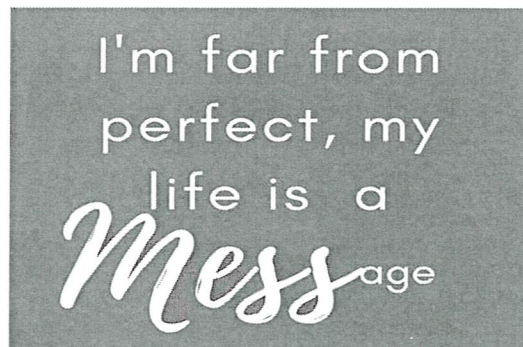
In the hours and days after doing my Fifth Step I didn't feel so altered that I was sure I was next on the list for sainthood, but, my steps seemed just a little bit lighter, laughter came a bit easier, and the birds—my gosh how did so many birds suddenly come to live outside my back door?

Step Five, followed by Steps Six and Seven, gave me the opportunity to recognize and name my less than admirable shortcomings and ask my Higher Power, who I now call God, for help in removing them.

The 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous are in the order they are meant to be worked and we work them over and over again. Each time a challenge arises or my feelings are hurt, I know that the Steps are there waiting for me, guiding me over the rough spots of life.

I am a work in progress.

We will share with you the purpose of this outreach, the importance your service to Minneapolis Intergroup, and a volunteer's past experience of visiting a group. It is a great way to try a new meeting and be of service!

We now have the newest Grapevine book in the office, *Fun in Sobriety*. The personal stories in *Fun in Sobriety* describe how, freed from alcohol, people can and do live life to the fullest!

Do you remember your first Gopher State Roundup? My first one was when I was 11 months sober and not comfortable doing *anything* sober! I was in a halfway house and went on a Saturday night. I never knew there were so many alcoholics in this city. I could not believe they were having so much fun without alcohol. Who knew!

Minneapolis Intergroup has again registered for Suite 215 at the Gopher State Roundup XLIV on Friday, May 27th and Saturday, May 28th at the DoubleTree by Hilton in Bloomington. 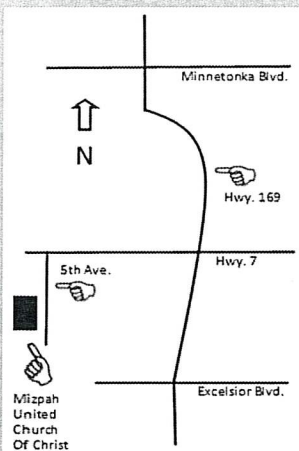

## Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

**Concept V: Concept V: Throughout our world service structure, a traditional “Right of Appeal” ought to prevail, thus assuring us that minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered.**

In Alcoholics Anonymous, we place tremendous value on the minority opinion. Concept V says it is our chief protection against an uninformed, misinformed, hasty, or angry majority. Why do we need protection against those things? Because these characteristics are a normal part of human nature. It is easy to get on bandwagons or react to sound bites without having all the information. It is also tempting at times to make decisions in haste based on emotions – whether out of momentary excitement or anger. But we are a spiritual program rooted in spiritual principles. We have our Traditions and Concepts to help us stay focused on making decisions that are guided by these principles in all that we do individually and collectively. When we discuss something in AA we talk about it over a long period of time. We strive to allow ample opportunity for groups, GSRs, Delegates, etc. to discuss, debate, and provide feedback. We listen to others’ viewpoints. After allowing for discussion and debate a vote is taken. Most things we vote on require substantial unanimity meaning that more than two thirds of the people voting agree. If complete unanimity is not reached, the minority gets to speak to the minority. This is how we go to great lengths to respect the opinion of each individual member.

The “petition” aspect of Concept V offers another safeguard. It protects against a majority taking actions that might not in the best interests of AA or are contrary to our Traditions and Concepts. I would like to illustrate this by using a fictitious example.

Mickey Mouse, delegate for the Looney Tunes Area and a member of some future Conference, introduces an idea to change the name of our fellowship from “Alcoholics Anonymous” to “Be Sober” (BS). The proposal adds that our General Service Office should be renamed Business Office for Be Sober (BO BS). Almost everyone present thinks it is a great idea and one that should be acted on immediately. No one seems to consider the ramifications – that we would have to change all our literature to reflect the name change, or that we might want to get feedback from the groups. The Conference votes in favor by a large majority. The minority speaks and raises several issues, but no one changes their vote. The proverbial train is in motion...

Is there no recourse in this crazy example? Thankfully, there would be. The Right of Petition allows any member of the service structure, whether paid or volunteer, to petition for redress of a personal grievance. They could complain directly to the General Service Board without prejudice or fear of reprisal. Actions could be taken to stop the train before it got too far out of the station. Concept V provides tools that help us slow down and consider things carefully so that AA can continue to be the best fellowship we can be.

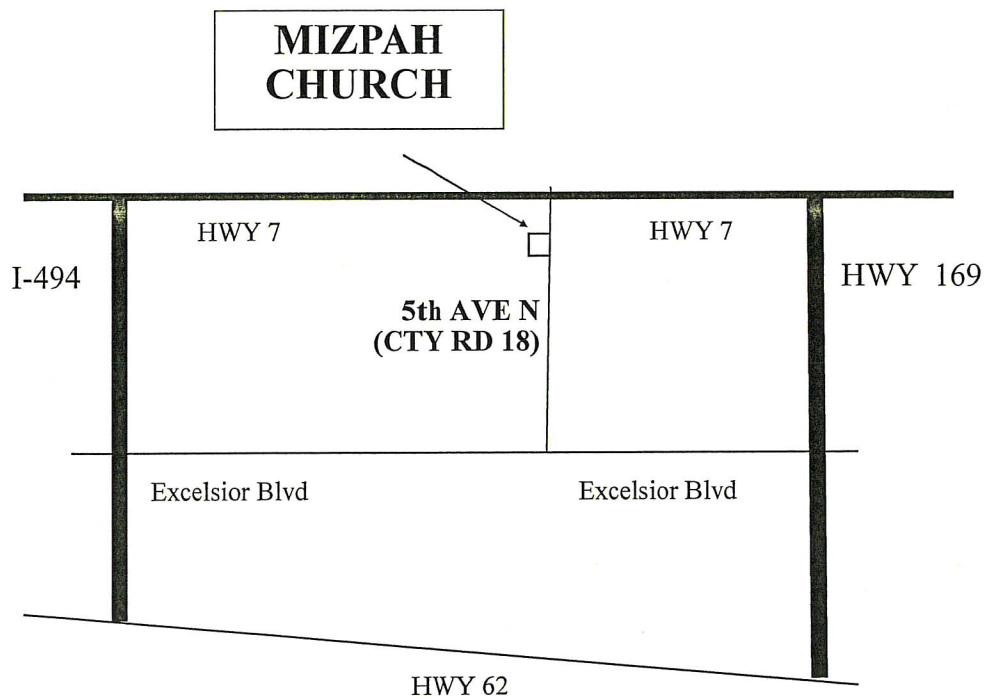

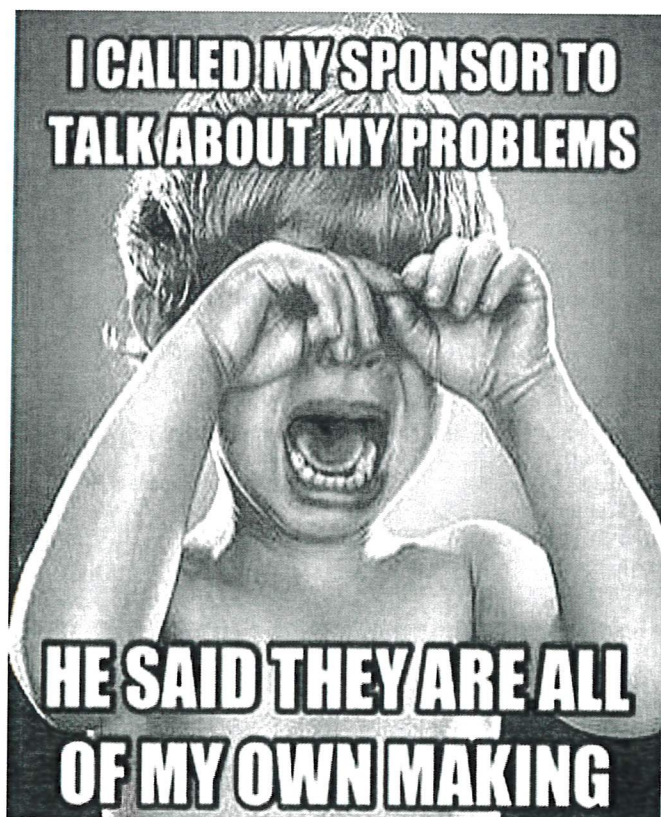
## The Twelve Traditions - How They Apply In Our Lives

### From the Traditions Checklist

Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

1. Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?
