December 2022 Step, Tradition, and Concept Twelve

"Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and practice these principles in all our affairs."

After 9 years of attending sporadic meetings, not working the steps, choosing an indifferent sponsor, and simply failing to practice any aspect of the suggested program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I found myself in a hospital on deaths door; bewildered and riddled with fear. The good news is that for the first time I was in a state of complete defeat (Step 1). I was destroyed to a place of willingness and compliance. So began my journey into the steps and the spiritual experience necessary to stay in a state of recovery.

Now convinced that I was an alcoholic, and that my life had become unmanageable, I became willing to believe a power greater than myself could and would need to reverse the insanity that I had created (Step 2). Through a guided, disciplined practice of visualization of me walking into the arms of a Higher Power of my choice, feeling the love and hope, it became easier to make the decision to turn my will and life over (Step 3) to this revealed source of love and power. As I gained strength through prayer and meditation I described above. I powered through an inventory (Step 4) that revealed a life driven by fear and selfcenteredness, and with the vigilant help of a great sponsor, we made the discovery of the character defects that were standing in the way of becoming the person I and God always wanted to be (Step 5). Progression through the steps became more exciting as I witnessed the continued presence of God in my life (Steps 6&7).

The ever growing proof of his existence was creating the spiritual awakening necessary to stay in a state of recovery. The conversion I had experienced in the working the next four steps (Steps 8-11). I changed from a self-driven person to someone who was daily recognizing and seeking the help and love of his higher power. It was at this point I received the gift that was the psychic change that the Big Book describes as what is necessary to recover, and is what is essential in order to carry the message to another suffering alcoholic (Step 12).

In reviewing my experience in working the steps with my sponsor and acknowledging the gratitude I had for God and others who helped guide me into this new life, I now knew that I was one of the uniquely equipped, with the obligation to share my experience, strength and hope with any who seemed my help.

The third part of the 12th step is the practicing of the principals in ALL our affairs. To everyday seek to practice honesty, hope, faith, courage, integrity, willingness, humility, brotherly love, justice, perseverance, spirituality, and service, is a clear design for living that brings about the many gifts of this program. Aspiring to assert these ideals into every area of my life is a full time job only done by committing to these actions on a one day at a time basis. My actions and desires of yesterday have little effect on what will happen in my life today.

In truth, practicing each and every step in the order they are presented, is the only path for a real alcoholic like me to experience the incredible gifts and revelations given to us in the 12th step. If you fail to follow this path, I'm afraid you might find yourself in a place that I floundered in, as described in the 9 years of half measures.


So, it is the above structure that is responsible for the above services.



Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

Concept XII

"General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decisions be reached by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action."

The warranties in Concept Twelve provide important guidance to the Conference and to us. They were considered so important that changing them requires the written consent of three-quarters of all directory-listed A.A. groups. This ensures that change will only happen after a considerable amount of time is allowed for careful deliberation. The principles in Concept 12 protect us from being hasty, imprudent, or dictatorial. They set us apart from other entities.

This Concept begins ensures that the Conference will conform

to A.A.'s Twelve Traditions just like the groups and individuals do. Conference members are charged with keeping the spiritual nature of the program uppermost in mind as they act on behalf of A.A. in the United States and Canada. In my two years at the Conference, that is what I saw. I encourage you to read the 12th Concept to become more familiar with this part of our history.

Whether you agree or disagree with the actions of a particular Conference, it is important to remember that the Conference, like the groups, is guided by a loving God that gets expressed in our group conscience. We do not take our jobs lightly. As I mentioned in my report backs, each conference committee spends an average of 9 hours discussing and debating the issues before their committee. Each committee forwards its recommendations to the Conference. Then Conference members spend about 18 hours discussing and debating the business put before them. All of this is after groups, districts, and areas have spent time discussing, debating, and informing their delegates on their views related to the agenda items put forth for the Conference members to consider. Finally, when we vote, we insist on achieving substantial unanimity on almost everything decided by the Conference. It is a rigorous process and one that helps us not be hasty or imprudent with our decisions.

The Conference is not a form of government. We do not dictate matters. Conference members are like the trusted

servants of Tradition Two. We are entrusted to act on behalf of A.A., but we are expected to remain democratic in thought and action. We don't rule by mandate. We don't have any power to inflict punishment on our members. Groups don't get involved in punishing members and neither does the Conference. This is important to note because A.A. members might not agree on any given year with the actions of the Conference. But we don't punish those with which we disagree. I've heard it said in A.A. to wait around and the issue will come up again. I have experienced that myself and you will too – if you haven't already.

This is my last Concept article as your Delegate. It has been a wonderful journey! I will end with a few words from Concept Twelve that remind me of our higher focus: "Freedom under God to grow in His likeness and image will ever be the quest of Alcoholics Anonymous. May our General Service Conference be always seen as a chief symbol of this cherished liberty. To a man, we of A.A. believe that our freedom to serve is truly the freedom by which we live – the freedom in which we have our being."

Traditions Checklist

Tradition Twelve: Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

- 1. Why is it a good idea for me to place the common welfare of all AA members before individual welfare? What would happen to me if AA as a whole disappeared?
- 2. When I do not trust AA's current servants, who do I wish had the authority to straighten them out?
- 3. In my opinions of and remarks about other AAs, am I implying membership requirements other than a desire to stay sober?
- 4. Do I ever try to get a certain AA group to conform to *my* standards, not its own?
- 5. Have I a personal responsibility in helping an AA group fulfill its primary purpose? What is *my* part?
- 6. Does my personal behavior reflect the Sixth Tradition—or belie it?
- 7. Do I do all I can do to support AA financially? When is the last time I anonymously gave away a Grapevine subscription?
- 8. Do I complain about certain AAs' behavior—especially if they are paid to work for AA? Who made *me* so smart?
- 9. Do I fulfill all AA responsibilities in such a way as to please privately even my own conscience? Really?
- 10. Do my utterances always reflect the Tenth Tradition, or do I give AA critics real ammunition?
- 11. Should I keep my AA membership a secret, or reveal it in private conversation when that may help another alcoholic (and therefore me)? Is my brand of AA so attractive that other drunks want it?

What is the real importance of *me* among more than a million AAs?

Dec 1934 to May 1935 – Bill works with alcoholics, but fails to sober any of them. Lois reminds him HE is sober.


Dec 1938 - Twelve Steps written.


