August 2024 Step, Tradition, and Concept Eight

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.."

Early in sobriety I thought Step 8 was simply an administrative activity. i.e. make a quick list and get on with Step 9. Today, I know that Step 8 is one of the most consequential steps in my recovery. Let me explain.

Steps 6 & 7 get one paragraph each on page 76 of the Big Book. These two steps, where our focus turns from inward to outward and our lives begin to change in ways we could have never imagined, couldn't possibly have less coverage. My first time through the steps, my experience with 6 & 7 was predictable. After completing Step 5, I took an hour to read the book and contemplate these steps. Was I ready (Step 6)? Yes. Did I ask God to remove my defects (Step 7)? Yes. Done. I was sober 9 months, in my mid-20s, and thought removal of my defects would be magical. Boy, was I in for a shock! Today, I'm sober over 40 years and know that removal of my defects is a life-long project.

The 'magic' of it lies in the work I do in the remaining 5 steps...8 - 12, with Step 8 being pivotal. Like many of the steps, the simple language in the second half of this step...'and became willing to make amends to them all'...has deeper meaning and implications. At least it does for me. To be truly willing to make a sincere amend, I first need to understand and own my part in the harm done. In Steps 4 & 5 I identify and explore what drives my misguided behaviors...primarily fear and shame. In the second half of Step 8 I come to understand the impact that my behavior has had on others. Without this, I'm doomed to repeat the harms, over and over.

I have several powerful examples of this in my recovery, let me share one: A few years into recovery, I met and befriended another sober fellow named Donny. We attended the same meeting on Wednesdays and started golfing together. After several hundred rounds, Donny and I had become fast friends. In 2016, amid an emotional and divisive political season, we found ourselves in opposite camps. This was no surprise, as we always knew we had different political leanings...but this time was different. One evening out for fellowship after our meeting, we got into a 'debate' about the election, something we'd done

before. I have a tendency toward self-righteousness and imperious behavior...and it was in full force that evening. Suddenly, Donny threw down his dinner napkin and said 'I'm out of here,' and got up and left.

Things changed after that. Even though we apologized to each other, we were never the same. Soon after, he found another meeting and we stopped golfing together. Over the next several years I made attempts to mend the relationship, to no avail. It appeared the friendship was over. I felt a great sense of loss, as I had come to love this friend.

One time I went to hear a renowned social scientist give a talk. His topic was the acute state of divisiveness in our country. His thesis was that the two sides of our political spectrum had, over the last several years, shifted from disagreement to actual contempt for one another. He defined contempt as believing that you are completely right, and the other person is completely wrong. That those who disagree with you are either stupid or somehow less than you.

I suddenly realized what I had done to Donny. I had treated him with contempt; had implied that his ideas were stupid and completely wrong. I didn't try to understand his point of view, or respect his right to have his own point of view. I finally understood how my actions had made him feel.

We got together for coffee shortly after that, during which I made a completely different amend. I told him the whole story of the talk I heard, and that I now understood the impact of my behavior. I apologized. He accepted my explanation and thanked me. I was hopeful we could rekindle our friendship. Unfortunately, my dear friend suffered a major stroke two weeks later and passed away.

I never got to rekindle that friendship, but feel that I repaired it as best I could. And just as importantly, I understand the impact my words can have on other people. Today I am vigilant against contempt; my contempt for the opinion of others. I hope I never cause such harm again.



Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

CONCEPT VIII

The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities.

Concept VIII offers a roadmap for continuing services to A.A. as a whole, in order to carry the message.

I started my essay last year on Concept VIII with the above sentence, and I think it is appropriate to start this year's the

sentence, and I think it is appropriate to start this year's the same way, as it is so very important.

We ask a great deal of our Trustees. We entrust them with the "primary responsibility for the good conduct of all our world service affairs" (Service Manual Concept VIII essay). We ask them to undertake this responsibility, as well as providing the Fellowship with the literature, service pieces, pamphlets, guidelines, etc., which we use to carry the message. Alcoholics Anonymous has two corporations, A.A. World Services (A.A.W.S.), and the Grapevine. Each are overseen by a separate board, which brings the total number of boards serving A.A., as a whole, to three, when you include our General Service Board. It is good to remember that those serving on our boards, as Trustees or Non-Trustee Directors, do so for no compensation. They do it because they love Alcoholics Anonymous, whether they be alcoholic or non-alcoholic members of those boards.

They address matters of finance and policy, public relations, and communication with groups and individual A.A. members. They keep our books, pay our bills, maintain relationships with vendors and businesses, and share with us how our 7th Tradition money is being used. They do these things to serve A.A., so we, as individuals and home group members, can carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic.

Our Trustees, along with the paid staff in New York, make the continued health and growth of A.A. possible. And we participate by bringing our voices to our home group, to our district, to our Area, and to the General Service Conference through our Delegate. This is how we participate directly in the decision-making process for A.A. Our Trustees are assisted by

talented and dedicated staff, along with our two additional boards, to do the things that the Fellowship simply cannot manage day-to-day. They do this so the Fellowship can do what we do best. Carry the Message.

The Twelve Traditions How They Apply In Our Lives

These questions * were originally published in Grapevine in conjunction with a series of articles on the Twelve Traditions that ran from November 1969 to September 1971. While they were originally intended as suggestions for individual use, many AA groups have since adopted them and use them as a basis for wider discussion.

Tradition Eight: Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

- 1. Does my own behavior accurately mirror the Traditions? If not, what needs changing?
- When I chafe about any particular Tradition, do I realize how it affects others?
- 3. Do I sometimes try to get some reward—even if not money—for my personal AA efforts?
- 4. Do I try to sound in AA like an expert on alcoholism? On recovery? On medicine? On sociology? On AA itself? On psychology? On spiritual matters? Or, heaven help me, even on humility?
- 5. Do I make an effort to understand what AA employees do? What workers in other alcoholism agencies do? Can I distinguish clearly among them?
- 6. Do I know where my local meeting directory comes from?
- 7. In my own AA life, have I had any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition?
- Have I read the book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions?
 How about the pamphlet "A.A. Tradition—How It Developed".
- 9. Can my group rely on me to fulfill my service responsibilities without someone checking on me?






