September 2024 Step, Tradition, and Concept Nine

"Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."

By the time I got to Step Nine I was already seeing many of the promises from pages 83-84 of the Big Book, come true for me. I was experiencing a new freedom and a new happiness. I was comprehending the word serenity, and I was experiencing a newfound peace of mind. My whole attitude and outlook upon life was changing and evolving. Now I needed to take action that would help me to not regret my past, nor to shut the door on it.

In the eighth step I made a list of people that I knew I needed to make direct amends to. Members of my family were at the top of the list, followed by friends that I had wronged, in part because of my alcoholic drinking and thinking.

My biggest lesson in the "amending" process was with someone I considered a forever friend since childhood. I was stunned to find out she had already written me off. She reluctantly met with me at a restaurant, where she angrily related my bad behavior and broken promises. I was a blackout drinker and I only vaguely recognized some instances she described. I sincerely made my amends, then continued to listen to her rage on about what a terrible person I was. At the end of her rant, she said she never wanted to see me again. Ever. This is not what I expected. I was devasted. And I couldn't accept that she still rejected me, even after I had apologized!

How did I deal with her onslaught of grievances? I self-righteously concluded that as a "normie," she couldn't comprehend that I was sick, had gotten help, and had changed. Yes, I did some bad things, but why didn't she understand that I'm not that person anymore? I did not say this out loud, of course. The whole experience felt like a nightmare.

After much time, I came to understand that while indulging in self-pity and excuses, I had missed the whole point of Step Nine. My motive had been to repair the relationship and once again gain my friend's acceptance and love. My sponsor gently reminded me (more than once) that I had no control over the outcome of amends-making. I had cleaned up my side of the street and that was all I could do. This was something of an epiphany for me. It still hurt to lose a lifelong friendship, but I had permission to let go of the guilt.

I continue to make direct amends, and living amends. I try to do the next right thing and be a better person. Service work with the Minneapolis AA Intergroup is a very important part of my living amends. I find that helping other alcoholics to achieve sobriety also helps me.


As I become more honest with myself, I see other amends that need to be made. So, I soldier on and call on my faith in a power greater than I to face my fears and right my wrongs. And I consult my sponsor on the how, when and where of each amends. The process gets easier as the wisdom of the ninth step becomes clearer.

I picked up some tips for making successful amends: be calm, don't argue, accept the outcome, stay in your own lane, and go in with a spirit of willingness and sincerity. Step Nine gives me a pathway to freedom that is gained by cleaning up the past; a freedom to live peacefully in the present. Another promise comes true.



Twelve Concepts for World Service, written by Bill W. in 1962

CONCEPT IX

Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety. The primary world service leadership once exercised by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous

The Concept IX essay opens with these words:

No matter how carefully we design our service structure of principles and relationships, no matter how well we apportion authority and responsibility, the operating results of our structure can be no better than the personal performance of those who must man it and make it work.

This is our invitation to be servant leaders wherever we serve, from greeter at the home group to Trustee. Servant leadership sounds almost aspirational, like it would be great if it were possible, but not practical. It is practical however, by the very nature of Alcoholics Anonymous itself. Remember our upsidedown triangle, where the groups are at the top and the Trustees at the bottom. Servant leaders aren't born, it doesn't come naturally to most of us; rather they become, through doing. As we participate fully in A.A. we learn fully what A.A. is. This means going to the business meeting before we know or care about the group's business. The coffee was on when I got here, what more do I need to know? At the business meeting we then get elected coffee maker, and then we're invested in that coffee, and the meeting, and the newcomer. We are becoming servant leaders. Then we get elected G.S.R. (General Service Rep), or asked to serve on committees and we're asked to give up additional time, to serve our group or district, and we invested in that role. We are becoming servant leaders, by serving with other servant leaders.

A.A., by its very nature is, one alcoholic who has made a little bit of progress helping another alcoholic, and service in A.A. is no different. I learn how to be a servant leader from you, by watching and listening as The Traditions are applied when we disagree. By participating in disagreements not to "win", but to serve. Servant leaders lead us by "Practicing these Principles" in all of *our* affairs, so the outcome of leadership is to reach the still suffering alcoholic; that person or persons at the very top of our triangle, those just about to come in the doors. Servant leaders are found everywhere in A.A., and every service



position is an opportunity to become a servant leader. As I heard early on, you don't have to want to do it, you just have to do it. Eventually is becomes a "get to do it" and a "grateful to do it."

The Twelve Traditions -How They Apply In Our Lives

These questions * were originally published in Grapevine in conjunction with a series of articles on the Twelve Traditions that ran from November 1969 to September 1971. While they were originally intended as suggestions for individual use, many AA groups have since adopted them and use them as a basis for wider discussion.

Tradition Nine: AA, as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

- 1. Do I try to "boss" things in AA?
- 2. Do I ever resist formal aspects of AA because I see them as authoritative?
- 3. Do I try to understand and use all elements of the AA program—even if no one makes me do so—with a sense of personal responsibility?
- 4. Do I exercise patience and humility in any AA job I take?
- 5. Am I aware of all those to whom I am responsible in any AA job?
- 6. Why doesn't every AA group need a constitution and bylaws?
- 7. Have I learned to step out of an AA job gracefully—and profit thereby—when the time comes?
- 8. What has rotation to do with anonymity? With humility?
